#### **ASK JAFAR**



Dear Jafar: I found a dog that I plan to keep but he is missing hair and his skin is crusty in some spots. I called the vet and they said he probably has mange. Is it curable?

Yes, it is, so here is how to recognize, treat, and prevent mange in dogs. Mange in dogs in caused by one of two types of microscopic mites, one of which is highly contagious. If your dog is itching like crazy or you notice patches of thinning or missing fur, your pup may have mange. This irritating skin condition is caused by microscopic mites that infest the skin. But there's no need to stress: Mange in dogs is preventable and treatable. The sarcoptic mite most commonly causes mange. This type of mange is called scabies. Your dog can catch these parasites from another animal or from contaminated bedding and give them to you. Highly contagious, but once treated and the pet is isolated for two weeks, everything is over and all will be fine. Demodectic mites, on the other hand, are naturally present in

the roots of your dog's fur (called hair follicles). They're passed from mother to pup during the first few days of life. Usually, a dog's immune system keeps demodectic mites in check, but mange outbreaks can occur if the mite population grows out of control. Mange caused by demodectic mites isn't contagious and is totally curable. At Peewee's, we just give them one Bravecto pill and it is done 99% of the time. In most severe cases of demodectic mange, you might have to treat longer. While you may be tempted to use a home remedy or over-te-counter product to relieve your dog's itching, it won't help in the long run. Getting rid of the mites is a must to treat mange. Schedule an exam with your local vet for an official diagnosis to find out what kind of mange your dog has and how to best treat it. Mange symptoms are similar to other skin conditions in dogs. Your veterinarian will take a skin scraping or hair sample and look at it under a microscope. The skin scrape may temporarily cause the skin to look more irritated, but it's important to do! It's easy to see demodectic mites under the microscope. To treat, we

use isoxazoline medications—a group of drugs that many once-monthly flea and tick control products contain. We've found that they're very good at treating both types of mites, in addition to their primary use for fleas and ticks. You can expect your pet to feel better within a few days of taking the oral medication. Your dog may also need antibiotics to help clear up any secondary skin infections. When I came to Peewee's, I had mange, but after treatment and loving care, I got my appetite back, my hair back, and I even got this job as a reporter and educator at Peewee's.

In other words, pet insurance is as detailed and complicated as choosing your own health insurance. It was really hard to do the research for this article. I am 17 years old and have cataracts and don't see so good and now have a chronic bone marrow immune disorder which I am on medication for. I hope to continue to be your advisor for some time to come. I don't need pet insurance as vet care is my payment for my services to Peewee's as a reporter.

I have excellent vet care from Dr. Garett, our President, and lots of love from my mommy, Ernie.

Lucky

Snowy, a dehydrated skeleton of a husky, was found way past the Botanical Gardens covered in ticks and starving with not a house in sight. Someone tried really hard to get rid of her and cause her death, but she survived and thrived and became a sweetheart. She lives in the forest of Michigan with a wonderful retired couple. Pete came to us with cuts all over his body, tortured on purpose by some mean people in the valley. After almost 100 stitches, lots of antibiotics, and wearing a cone for three weeks, he healed nicely and lives in New Jersey with a wonderful family and children. These 3 pups were taped up in this box and thrown into a ditch on Old Brownsville Road where a Good Samaritan heard their screams. After treatment for mange, allergies, and worms, they survived, were fully vetted, and went to New York to live happily ever after. Lucky, who is lucky to be alive, required an eye enucleation for a punched-out eye and a leg amputation for a smashed leg that was not repairable. He came from the valley with no hair but with a heart of gold, even though humans had only shown cruelty towards him. He loves the air-conditioning and his soft bed and now has a family of his own on the East Coast. Terry came to us from Corpus Christi Animal Care Services (the dog pound) with two broken legs. The rear leg healed after being cast, but the front one was beyond help and had to be amputated. He was a brave little one, never complained and learned to walk on three legs in no time. He lives in Canada in a resort town north of New England. Ali was found wandering around in the west side of town where mean kids threw rocks at him on a regular basis. Thank God a good Samaritan rescuer trapped him and brought him to us. With good medicine and good food he grew friendly, grew hair, and is now living on the east coast with a nice loving family of his own. Puppy is about a 6-month-old pup that came to us from a kill shelter in the valley after being run over on the streets of Harlingen. He was unable to walk and had both front legs broken. He accepted his casts like a champ and with his Elizabethan cone to keep him from removing them, he is healing quite nicely. Hopefully by the time you get this newsletter, he is out of his casts and on his way to a good life. Lulu, our distemper survivor, arrived at four months old from the Valley, and within two weeks, she started twitching and chewing which are neurological signs of distemper. She went to a foster home so she would not expose other dogs to the highly contagious disease, and she survived. After two months in isolation, she quit the teeth chewing, but will have some twitching as residual damage for the rest of her life. She is the sweetest, happiest, most playful girl and still awaits that

Ricky – same old story, "owner died, can't afford to take dog to the vet, will you take him?" He has had allergies and demodex mange for so long, we are not sure he will ever grow hair, but we are trying. He is super ugly, but a real sweetheart, and we are trying our best to find him a home that he well deserves. Sunny came to us with heartworms and a hopelessly mangled leg from a kill shelter. He never complained and was always glad to receive a hug, a kiss, or a treat. He received treatment and his leg was removed as it was not fixable. He runs on three legs and is now spending time on the beaches of the East Coast. 2 pups were left loose outside our gate in the middle of the night, covered in mange, itching and starving. Thank God they did not wander onto Saratoga and

After veterinary treatment, good medicine, and good food, they grew happy and healthy and went to live in Michigan where loving families adopted them and are giving them the life they deserve. found **Kitty** under his truck at an apartment complex. The eye hanging out had been like that for some time. Good food, antibiotics, and Dr. Gunn's removal of the eye not only saved his life, but made him feel better right away. How about coming and adopting this sweet one-eyed miracle?

Jesus, I pray that you help convert all the mean people in South Texas into better humans to stop the cruelty we see every day done unto your precious pets.
