FUREVER GRATEFUL





ASK LULU

Dear Lulu.

I've never had a dog, but my kids want a dog and they are 6 and 8 years old. What kind should I get?

This question is one that goes deeper than what kind should I get. A dog is a family member that can live up to 20 years. Do you want a new family member to take care of, who will live in the house no matter what, and that you will spend bookoo bucks on food, doctors, a trainer, etc. It is like having a third child forever. Are you prepared for that? Just like children, you will have to potty train it

and teach it not to be destructive around the house. You also need to educate yourself on veterinary needs, such as vaccinations, heartworm prevention, etc, etc. like you do for your children. You might require daycare for the dog if you are going to be gone for awhile during the day. You will need to take it to the park like a child, reprimand it like a child, brush it, bathe it like a human baby.....it is essentially a child. But unlike your kids who will grow up and become independent, the dog will always be dependent on you as long as it lives. Like your baby, you shouldn't even think about giving it away to a person or a shelter as you would never do that to your own flesh and blood baby. If you cannot commit to all of this, you should not get a dog. Even if your children are older and swear they will take care of it themselves when they leave home, 9 times out of 10, this will never happen. If you are thinking you will just get them a cat instead, I hate to tell you that even though they are a little easier to take care of, it all still applies. You need to clean the litter box daily, brush them, take them to the doctor, and you should never let a cat outside. Here in

Corpus Christi, it is a death sentence. Maybe not tomorrow or this year, but something bad will happen to it outside.

And cats live even longer than dogs.

I was a pretty poodle puppy once. No one took me to the vet or groomed me. I lived in the streets of McAllen, Texas and was picked up by the pound. I came to Peewee's with distemper because no one took me to the veterinarian for all my vaccinations. They saved me at Peewee's but I have a bad tick on one of my arms and have seizures now. But

Ernie and Bobby give me medicine three times a day and that keeps me from having seizures. And because of my terrible childhood and being thrown away by my family and getting distemper, my life will only be 10 to 12 years from all the brain damage. So again, only if you can make a commitment to a dog or a cat to be a family member should you get one. We are not a stuffed animal from Walmart that you can just throw away – Signed, Lulu

Frenchie was turned in by the owner after his leg had to be amputated due to a fight with another one of her dogs. Of course, it had the usual skin problems, respiratory problems, etc from the inbreeding. I was flabbergasted, but I guess at least she did not go to the Walmart parking lot and give it to the first person who wanted a French Bulldog. Blackie is a very old big black dog whose owners no longer wanted him because they had a baby. He was found in the streets and brought to us. We found them because he was microchipped, but the owners said to just keep him. I hope they do not do the same thing with their grandparents if they get hit with dementia. Crusty is a hairless crusty mangy husky mix we got from a kill shelter in the valley where he wandered the streets and kids threw rocks at him until Animal Control got him and he was sentenced to death. But from death row to a home in the East Coast, he went to live happily ever after, all healed up, happy, and healthy. Crusty is one lucky dog. Fuzzy is a black longhaired kitty that was found in the streets matted and covered in sticker burrs. It looks like he was blind from birth and now grown. Someone probably moving threw him out to fend for himself, which he could not do given that he is Buddy blind. He was a skeleton, but still purring. He is now healthy and looking for a home, and I hope the people that put him out in the streets get what they deserve. Sweetie is a teenage cat that was found hanging from a fence almost dead. He had given up on being saved. His leg was torn, bones sticking out, and God only knows how long he had been there. The leg was not salvageable, but he was a fighter, got well, and now lives in Wisconsin. He is a perfect example of why you should not let your kitties outside! Reggie is a kind sweet chihuahua that was due to be put to sleep in a shelter in South Texas. He had been run over and had a broken leg. But now, after treatment, he is fine, grateful, happy, and has put on weight. He left Corpus Christi for a wonderful home on the East Coast. Red is a super mangy cat that someone on the west side of Corpus tried to treat with purple horse medicine, which, of course, did not work, so they left him in a box in front of a church. The parishioners brought him to us one Sunday and after IV fluids, medication, and time, he got well and is looking for a home. Buddy is a little dog that came to us in a lot of pain with a leg broken in four places. He had been put out in the streets by an owner who told their neighbor that they "didn't want him anymore, because he isn't a cute puppy anymore and he pees in the house." The neighbor saw him get run over and the owner said to take him to the pound. Instead, they brought him here to Peewee's. We had to amputate his leg, and through it all, he was sweet as pie. He went to Canada and lives with a wonderful couple and a pussycat. Mattie is a poodle matted to the skin that came to us from death row in the Valley. We literally get 20 to 30 like this once a month, covered in fleas and ticks, and their fur comes off in one giant piece. He had heartworms, a tick disease, and his teeth were rotting, but after vetting, his sweet personality blossomed and he found a wonderful home on the East Coast. Another Teddy Bear example, Bernard; this dogs mats literally cut off the circulation to his paw and his tissue rotted to the bone, but after six weeks of debridements and dressing changes, he lived, kept his paw, was able to walk and found a new I away from South Texas. Teddy Bear was dumped wearing a sweater at the water gardens downtown by the Selena auditorium. I guess that was better
